

GRADUATE PROFILE FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2010-2011

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The following Graduate Profile for the Class of 2010-2011 is intended to provide a baseline which may be useful to reference with future graduating classes. This profile report was requested during the summer of 2011 by Peter Burns, Vice President for Enrollment Management and Dean of Students. Thanks to Derise Hedges and Claudia Harhigh for providing the database upon which the following profile is based.

Demographics

During the 2010-2011 academic year a total of 173 students received degrees from Hilbert College, including 157 (91%) baccalaureate (BS/BA) and 16 (9%) Associate's (AA, AAS, AS) degrees. Fifty-five students (32%) completed their degree requirements at the end of the Fall 2010 semester.

Degree recipients were 62% female and 38% male.

The majority of graduates were White (78.6%); 9.3% were Black. One each were Hispanic and American Native and two graduates indicated more than one ethnicity (Black and Hispanic). Almost 1 in 10 (9.8%) chose not to disclose race or ethnicity.

The average age of at graduation was 22.5 years with a range from 19 to 52 years. All but one graduate (Ohio) was from New York State.

Admission Profile

Almost one-half of the graduates (49%) attended Hilbert as First-Time College students. Another 30% were Transfer students.

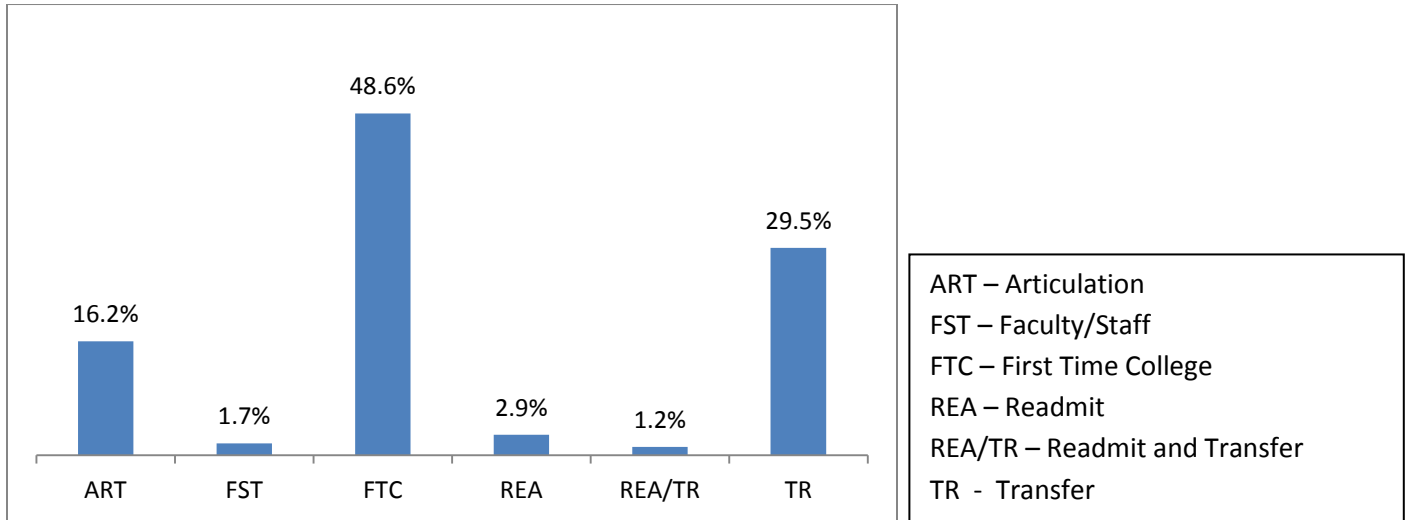


Figure 1. Population Status

The typical graduate had been admitted to Hilbert College during the Fall of 2007 (36%) although there was considerable variation in admission dates ranging from one graduate who had started in the Summer of 1994 and attending part-time almost without break until graduation, to two students who were readmitted during 2010 and completed second degrees in time to graduate in spring of 2011. Fifty-three percent (n = 91) of the graduates were admitted in the period from Fall of 2007 to Fall of 2008.

Most students were considered Full-Time while at Hilbert.

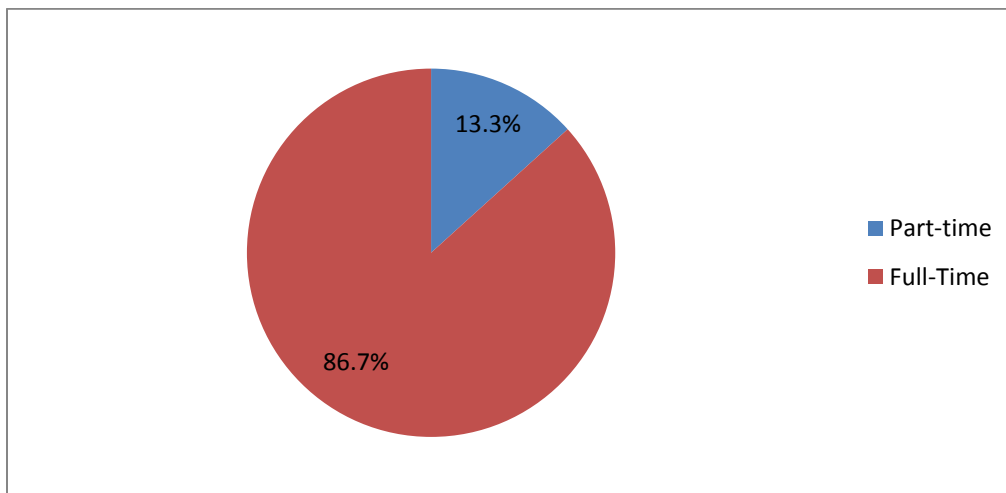
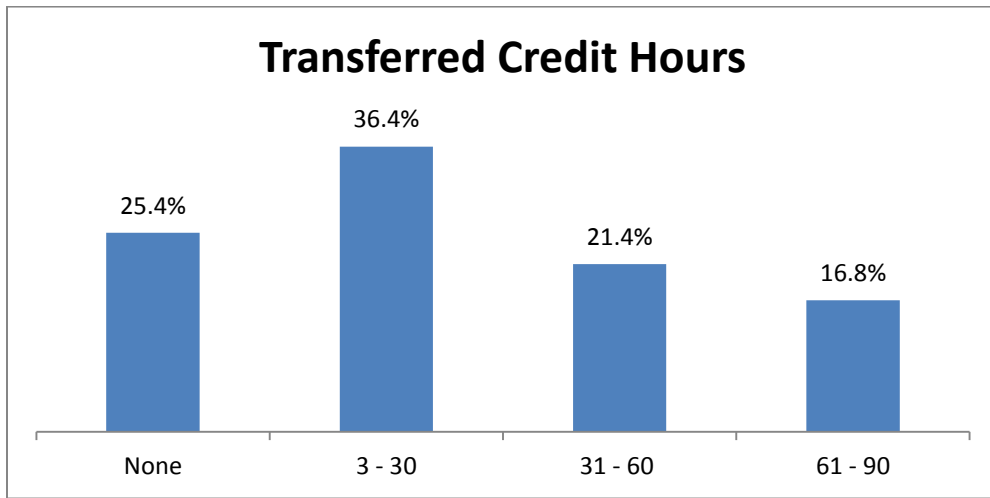


Figure 2. FT vs. PT

Among students who transferred credits from other institutions , most transferred no more than 30 credit hours.



Test Scores

Sixty-nine of the 173 (40%) graduates had reported SAT scores at the time of admission.

Only 12 or 7% of graduates had reported ACT scores with a mean ACT composite score of 20.

High School GPAs were reported on two scales.

For those reporting on a 0 – 4 scale the mean was 3.01 (n = 73, 42%).

For those reporting on a 0 – 100 scale, the mean was 85.33 (n = 79, 46%).

Twelve percent (n = 21) did not have a High School GPA in the database.

Of the 173 graduates, 63 (36.4%) received one or more scholarships from Hilbert.

Primary School Prior to Attending Hilbert College

Forty-six different High Schools were listed as a primary school in the admissions files; 16 of those were represented by more than one graduate. Topping the list was Frontier High School with 6 of Hilbert’s 2010-2011 graduates having come to Hilbert from that one high school.

COLLEGE PROFILE

Terms to Degree Completion

As one would expect the total number of terms (Fall, Spring & Summer semesters) varied depending on how many credits, if any, were transferred-in and on whether the student was attending full-time or part-time. Overall the number of terms attended ranged from as little as three to as many as 19 with an average (mean, median & mode) of 8 terms.

Residential Terms

Of the 173 graduates, 58 (33.5%) had at least one semester in residence, while 115 were commuters only. Of those graduates who resided on campus the number of terms in residence ranged from 1 to 10 with a mean average of 4.5 semesters.

Degrees Earned

As mentioned above, 91% of graduating students earned a Baccalaureate degree and 9% earned an Associate's degree. The breakdown by level and degree follows:

Prior Degrees

For 13 of the 2010-11 graduates this was their second Hilbert degree. Most had previously earned an Associate's degree and were now completing a baccalaureate in the same or related field, but 2 were graduating with their second bachelor's degree from Hilbert.

Honors

Fifty-one (29.5%) graduated with honors.

GPA

The mean average GPA for graduates was a 3.26.

Sixteen graduates had at least one semester during which their GPA for that semester was below a 1.00. Notably, all but one of those same individuals also had at least one semester in which their GPA was in the 3.0 to 4.0 range.
