B.S. Degree in Criminal Justice

A.A. Degree in Criminal Justice

The Hilbert associate in arts degree in criminal justice is a two-year program designed to prepare graduates in the criminal justice areas of police work, courts, probation, parole, youth counseling, retail security, and private security. It also serves to prepare you for a career in law areas allied with the various enforcement fields. The program is designed for in-service personnel as well as for persons wishing to prepare for service in the criminal justice fields.

Established Career Paths




