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
The Hilbert College graduate degree in Criminal Justice Administration consists of 36 credit hours. Students take one course at a time and move with a cohort, establishing colleagues and life-long friendships. Cohorts remain together throughout the 16-month program, changing a course of study every five weeks to complete 12 sessions. This model is convenient for individuals who are employed full-time.

Unique to Hilbert, the curriculum has been devised with an ongoing, integrated research project throughout the program. Unlike most graduate programs that ask for a final semester thesis, the Hilbert program allows for a more thorough application of theory and research as the project is initiated with an agency and developed throughout the coursework. The graduate research project is designed to help students apply classroom concepts and theories to practical issues and problems by framing the issue within the context of scientific research, and by developing information literacy lifetime learning skills.

The program provides an opportunity for students to explore and gain a deeper understanding of current issues facing the criminal justice system and the impact they have on the larger society.
